Central is happy to welcome The Reverend Aisha Brooks-Johnson as our guest preacher today. She serves as the Executive Presbyter for the Presbytery of Greater Atlanta serving 86 congregations and encouraging 26 new worshipping communities.

A native of Philadelphia, she earned a Bachelor of Science in Music from Temple University and a Master of Divinity degree from Princeton Theological Seminary. She has worked in mutliple roles at churches in Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York.

She recently married the Rev. Dr. Alonzo T. Johnson who serves as the Coordinator for the Self Development of People for the Presbyterian Church, USA headquartered in Louisville, Kentucky.

The painting on the front of this week's bulletin is, 'Landscape with Sheep,' by Robert Scott Duncanson. Duncanson was perhaps the most accomplished African-American painter in the United States during his time. By the 1860s the American press hailed him as the "best landscape painter in the West," while London newspapers touted his work as the equal to his British contemporaries.

645 Sing Praise to God Who Reigns Above



The regal divine imagery here will not be new to most singers, but some may not expect the third stanza's image of God as mother. Yet it is part of God's self-description in Isaiah 66:13. This Bohemian Brethren tune resembles both Genevan psalm tunes and French folk songs.



Each stanza of this enthronement text prepares for the final line of the refrain, based on Philippians 4:4. "Lord" is here a title of Christ rather than a reference to the undivided Trinity. The late 18th-century tune (first used with Psalm 148) captures the mood well.
