Thank you for your donations for Black Mountain!






Central Organizing Safety Team

Members and staff are exploring new ways to make our church buildings and the events we host both welcoming and safe. We want to provide a comfortable environment, and we also need to set clear expectations surrounding the use of our facilities when we gather.

Central's Facilities Committee and staff have begun working with Pegasus Solutions Group, a security firm composed of experienced emergency, fire, and safety professionals, to improve access to and security within our buildings. Part of that work is developing a staffing plan for different types of events. One suggestion, based on what security firm staff have initiated in their own congregations, is to gather a group of members to be trained as a safety team. Members know more about church buildings and the people who use them than anyone else.

With training and guidance provided by Pegasus, the team will learn how to respond to certain types of situations so that we are prepared to take action if needed. This is particularly important during the upcoming months as we approach the November election and its aftermath.

The goal is to find 10-15 members interested in participating. Members with medical or security training will be particularly helpful, as are those who frequently usher or serve Sunday breakfast. Team members would be on call each Sunday morning on a rotating basis to assist professional security staff in meeting the medical and security needs of members and guests.

Once this team is in action, you will notice an increased presence of members and security staff on Sunday mornings. We hope you will support this effort in

the spirit of caring for one another.

If you are interested in helping church staff and members by serving on the safety team, please plan to attend our first training session on Sunday, Oct. 27 at 12:15 p.m. in the Greene Room. The topic for the first session is *Basics of Safety Management in Church Programming*. We'll meet again at the same time on Nov. 3 for the final training session: *Central Campus and Specific Strategies*.



This Sunday, October 20, he will teach a combined adult class based on his most-recent book, "She Made a Way: Mother and Me in a Deep South World." Described as "a memoir of survival and growth under the twin threats of white supremacy and male dominance. It is an intimate story of perseverance and coming of age: how a single, white working mother and her only son made their way in the patriarchal and racist world of postwar Helena, Arkansas, a Mississippi river town." Central member John Blake wrote the forward to the book. This special class will take place in the Parlor off of Tull Hall.


The Sojourners class will return to the brief but powerful essays on Jesus' life and teachings found in Debie Thomas' book, Into the Mess and Other Jesus Stories: Reflections on the Life of Christ. Thomas focuses particularly on teachings of Jesus and events in the life of Jesus that present challenges in understanding and interpretation, and she acknowledges these challenges and provides her own refreshingly candid thoughts and associated questions for consideration. The "Wonders" and "Teachings" sections of the book have provided a basis for rich discussion in past class sessions.

This fall, the class will turn its attention to Thomas' essays in the category that she calls "Mysteries," covering Jesus' washing of the Disciples' feet, the crucifixion, the empty tomb, and more. Join us for conversations about Jesus' life and teachings that perhaps will be different from many you've had before. The Sojourners Class meets in the Brotherhood Room, off of Tull Hall. Central's book club, Bookworms, anticipates a lively conversation about Barbara Kingsolver's Pulitzer prizewinning novel "Demon Copperhead" at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, October 22, at the home of Frances St. John, 4555 Crestwicke Pointe, Atlanta, 30319. You are encouraged to bring your reactions, whether you've finished, couldn't finish, or have yet to start reading this celebrated book. Perhaps your reading of "David Copperfield" or "Hillbilly Elegy" informs your understanding in ways you'd like to share. Called by the judges' panel of the British Women's Prize an "exposé of modern America, its opioid crisis, and the detrimental treatment of deprived and maligned communities," "Demon Copperhead" was unanimously determined as their winner, with the chair reporting that the panel was "deeply moved by Demon, his gentle optimism, resilience, and determination despite everything being set against him. "Demon Copperhead" packs a triumphant emotional punch, and it is a novel that will withstand the test of time."
