



Church offices will be closed Good Friday and Easter Monday.


Children & Youth Updates

Want to Take Action?

This bill that recently passed the U.S. House of Representatives would keep millions of people from being able to vote. It requires in-person citizenship documentation and would end online and mail voter registration; potential voters who don't have passports, access to their birth certificates, or access to documents following a name change would be excluded from voting.

Bookworms Tuesday, April 22 7:30 p.m. Home of Rod Hunter

At our April meeting, Central's book club, Bookworms, will discuss *They Flew:* A History of the Impossible by Carlos Eire. Rod Hunter will lead our conversation about this compelling history, which, according to Yale University Press, "explores how a culture increasingly devoted to scientific thinking grappled with events deemed impossible by its leading intellectuals. Eire observes how levitating saints and flying witches were as essential a component of early modern life as the religious turmoil of the age."

Join us at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, April 22, at the Hunters' home, #302 at 417 Clairemont Ave., Decatur, 30030, to discuss the intriguing challenge: "Much of our present incredulity about these levitation narratives, along with the relative ease with which we dismiss them, rests on the assumption that we are more intellectually mature than our forebears; that Western history has followed a simple trajectory from a medieval age of superstition and credulity, through the progressive stages of a disenchanting Protestant Reformation and a scientific revolution, to arrive at a rational and enlightened modernity" (Public Discourse, Feb. 18, 2024). Are we "too smart" for miracles to have meaning for us?

Central Bible Study is a traditional Bible study class - what some would describe as "close examination of Scripture." The verse-by-verse approach will mean that we'll ofen cover, in a given class session, just one chapter of the Scripture book of interest. We'll use the NRSV translation of the Bible. The approach to Scriptural analysis will be critical in nature, and we'll



engage in Scriptural interpretation that reflects our Reformed theology. The first book of the Bible that will be explored by the Central Bible Study class will be the Gospel of John.

Issues in Theology: Shakespeare and Theology Sunday, April 27 Greene Room 9:45 to 10:45 a.m.





Lamenting Racism Sunday, April 27 Brotherhood Room 9:45 to 10:45 a.m.

You are invited to join us for a 6-week pop-up Sunday School class starting during Lent called *Lamenting Racism: A Christian Response to Racial Injustice*.



described: In Lamenting Racism, a team of



leading pastors and theologians invite us into the transformative and motivating practice of biblical lament as a powerful way to confront racism. Through their conversations in six thought-provoking videos, they name that God's people of every race are called to consider how we have been shaped and formed by race, and they guide us into experiencing lament as an anti-racism practice.

Encouraging congregations to reclaim the lost art of biblical lament, these pastors and theologians model a powerful way to pour out the fear, shame, grief, and rage of racism as we cry out to God in prayer. In the process, we will be transformed and motivated to reclaim hope and to act for a world shaped by God's inclusive vision of love and blessing.

We will gather during the Sunday School hour to watch a short video for the first 10-15 minutes and then have plenty of time for discussion and reflection. Our sessions continue April 27, May 4 and May 11, in the Brotherhood Room.

As a Matthew 25 church, Central has committed to dismantling systemic racism in our midst. With this short series, we have an opportunity as a congregation to name and lament racism and its impact as well as take new steps to live out our commitment to antiracism.
